#### **Group Support Model**

#### What support do we now have in place?

- A dedicated **Relationship Manager**, who has reached out to you to introduce themselves\*. Your Relationship Manager may be a Council Relationship Manager, a Scouting Relationship Manager or a **Group Support Scouter**—a new volunteer role created to ensure every Group receives the mentorship it needs.
- Access to a new **Group Support Centre**, an online hub designed to provide Group Commissioners with the answers and resources they need to be successful in their role. (**links and more info on page 6**)
- The **Group Commissioner Orientation Program**, which was piloted last Scouting Year, will be rolled out automatically to all new Group Commissioners in the coming weeks. Other Group Commissioners who are eligible to participate will be contacted by their Relationship Managers.
- Beginning in the 2019-20 Scouting Year, the Area Support Model was transitioned to the new **Group Support Model**. Generally, Areas have remained the same. Please see the table below for a detailed breakdown of what has changed and what has stayed the same.
